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A Proud Story of Military Service

Rosemarie Conlon is an original resident to The Beltrone Living Center and has lived at BLC since March 2000. Born in Albany on May 22, 1925, Rosemarie was the oldest of four children. She explained that she had a sister who was two years younger, then a brother ten years younger and finally, a brother twenty years younger than her! Her father had served in the Army in Europe during WW I and was employed as a truck mechanic.

At the age of 20, Rosemarie joined The Women's Army Corps (WAC) which was the women's branch of the United States Army. She explained that "All the boys were joining the service,

signing up. The guys could enlist at 17. I wasn't allowed to join until the age of twenty and had to get my parents' permission. My mother signed the papers."

Although Rosemarie is very humble and commented she did not work for anyone famous, her military record is quite impressive. She was secretary to the Colonel at the Head of the Pacific Military Intelligence Research Section at Camp Ritchie, MD., the Pentagon and then in Washington, D.C. She worked with a unit of American, British and Japanese linguists translating, searching and prioritizing Japanese documents for secret military and cultural information to assist the war effort. She remembers how some of her fellow WACs really struggled wearing the flat Army shoes being so used to high heels. The women all lived in barracks. She reached the rank of Staff Sergeant.

Rosemarie served in WAC for approximately 18 months and returned to the Capital Region in 1946. That same year she married James Conlon and moved to Colonie where they subsequently raised five children (one girl and four boys).

When asked how she reflects on her military service 75 years later, she said, "For me, it was a wonderful experience. I enjoyed it. You just had to watch your P's and Q's."

Rosemarie, thank you for your service to defend our nation and our freedom.

2020 Colonie Senior Spirit Award Nominations

Colonie Senior Service Centers, Inc. (CSSC) seeks nominations for the Colonie Senior Spirit Award through the end of August, for those who have made an outstanding contribution to seniors and their families in our community, based on the criteria categories of CSSC's founders.

Nomination Criteria

- 1. Nominee(s) must be an outstanding individual or organization located in the Capital Region who provided seniors with support, services or have advocated on their behalf which results in seniors remaining independent and allowing them to age in place in the community which they choose.
- **2.** Nominees must be nominated for one of the following criteria, that is based on the Founders of Colonie Senior Service Centers:

a) Transportation Award

Presented to an individual or organization for their efforts to promote independence and

self-reliance for seniors by developing and expanding senior transportation options.

b) Bright Horizons Award

Presented to an individual or organization for their commitment and achievement in providing and enhancing access to adult day services and caregiver support for seniors and their families.

c) Senior Dining Award

Presented to an individual or organization for their dedication and efforts to help seniors maintain their health through good nutrition.

d) Health & Wellness Award

Presented to an individual or organization for their commitment and dedication in developing opportunities for seniors to maintain and enhance their physical and intellectual talents.

e) Senior Housing Award

Presented to an individual or organization for their vision and leadership in developing housing options for seniors.

f) Building a Senior Community Award

Presented to an individual or organization for their efforts to identify and strengthen the existing network of services for seniors and their families.

- **3.** A nominee cannot be self-nominated, they must be recommended by a nominator
- **4.** Nominations should demonstrate the impact the nominee has had on individuals served or the efficiency of the organization in providing seniors with services and or support that meets their category criteria.

Nomination Process:

- Those eligible for nomination include individuals, companies or organizations that have made an outstanding contribution to maturing seniors and their families in our community.
- **2.** Nominators may submit a nomination for one applicable criteria per nominee.
- **3.** CSSC reserves the right to combine and remove categories as it sees fit.
- 4. Nominations will be reviewed by representatives of the CSSC Board of Directors, staff and community partners who make up the Annual Founders Committee.
- **5.** Application must be submitted by midnight on August 31, to be considered for the current year's Colonie Senior Spirit Award.
- **6.** Colonie Senior Spirit Awards will be presented this October to all winners.
